In overall, this project was designed to establish an environmental and social club in Al-Kharabolli, from the results of this project there is an interest about the awareness of the environmental issues among the local community.

It was implemented 4 events, 4 courses in different topics, 7 meetings with different relevant stakeholders,

2 collaborations with environmental associations and more than 100 beneficiaries and participations along this project, we established an informal environmental club with 16 members (10 male / 6 female), which is currently in the process of being formally registered. The registration process took longer than expected due to the situation in Libya and the political instability during the project implementation period

A team for conservation of Karabolli was created to be part of negotiation with the municipality for any important issue in the site. The team is composed by 16 persons (6females and 10 males) belonging to different ages and sectors

 - The second challenge was the instable security situation around the project area, because of the conflict and this made us delay the implementation 8 months.
 - The third challenge was distribution of COVID-19, which made it difficult to gather participants for the workshops and courses.

-A positive impact was receiving many invitations from the local community to make activities, but this happened at the last stage of the project. -some of the activists organized a clean-up day without our help after meeting with us.
